April 5, 1955 - March 31, 2019

Bruce Allen Smith, age 63 of Fallon, MT passed peacefully after a brief battle with a very rare, aggressive cancer on Sunday, March 31st, 2019 in Glendive, MT, with his wife Karen by his side.

Bruce was born on April 5th, 1955 in Willison, ND on a day that had thunder, lightning and snow! He was the third of four boys, born to Edward and Juliet (Ellevold) Smith. He was raised on the farm south of Dagmar, MT. The Smith place raised small grains, hay, hogs, cattle, sheep, chickens and the family always raised a large garden, all of which served him well later in life as an Extension Agent. He was raised in the Lutheran faith. He was a proud Medicine Lake Honker and his 6'11" frame served him in track (as a high jumper & shot putter) and in basketball, besides it being a great conversation starter. He was MVP of the state Class B basketball tournament in 1972 and was one of the Scholastic Coach's Top 100 Basketball players in the US two years running.

Bruce met his future wife, Karen Skedsvold, at a dance in Culbertson. They were married in 1974. They both attended MSU-Bozeman. Bruce earned a full basketball scholarship and graduated with honors (a BS in Ag Production-Animal Science) in 1977. Bruce played basketball in Bourg-en-Bresse, France for 1978-79 season. He and the team's travels took them through the southern half of France.

Upon returning to the US, Bruce also returned to MSU and graduated with honors with a BS in Ag Business in 1979. He returned to the family farm and built up his own sheep flock. Elizabeth was born in 1980. Drought and grasshoppers made those last years tough, so Bruce entered graduate school at Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo and earned his MBA in 1987. JoAnna was born in 1985 while in California. Bruce commuted every day to school. He worked construction and built fences to make ends meet. Upon graduating he went to work for Pillsbury/Green Giant processing vegetables in Watsonville, CA. The family went through the Loma Prieta earthquake in 1989; it was time to move.

They moved to Illinois; and at the age of 35, Bruce became the youngest Plant Manager for Van den Bergh Foods, the producer of 'I Can't Believe It's Not Butter.' In 1993 they moved to Idaho where Bruce was the Manufacturing Manager of the Universal Frozen Foods French fry plant. He went through the second corporate buy-out of his career and knew it was time to get back to Montana. The family spent the next couple of years in Twin Bridges while Bruce commuted back and forth to Whitehall as the Madison/Jefferson County Extension Agent. When the Dawson County Extension position opened in 1996, Bruce applied, in part to be closer to both he and Karen's families.

Turned out being an Extension Agent in a single-agent county was an almost perfect job for Bruce. He could go from agriculture to horticulture to community development to youth programs to family consumer sciences all in one day, if need be.

As an avid local foods advocate, Bruce helped start the Farm-to-Table Project, the Glendive Saturday Farmers' Market, the Glendive Community Garden, the Glendive Food Development Center, the Farm-to Table Store and the Farm-to-Table Cooperative.

Bruce served on several local, state and regional boards (he traveled throughout Montana and the region). He was extremely interested in helping people and communities become more self-sustaining.

Bruce reached his goal of making 1,500 bird houses for 4-H camp, all of them made from scrap lumber and old pallets he cut himself. He so enjoyed seeing the bird houses he helped campers build show up at the many county fairs in the region and on fence posts around the area. Bruce spent over 35 years involved in 4-H as a member, leader and County Agent.

Bruce was an extrovert. He enjoyed a chance to converse with the many people he met traveling and working throughout Montana, the US and France. He spent endless hours researching in genealogy; he loved metal detecting, reading and collecting books, and building things. From an early age he showed a penchant for collecting all things. Everything had a use to him, even if no one else could see it. Seldom, if ever, did he throw something away, he believed everything could be recycled.

He received several awards and honors that he was especially proud of and treasured.

He loved to visit, laugh, teach, share, learn/read, collect, go to his daughters' games and now to his grandchildren's games. He was ever so proud of his two daughters and his grandchildren.

He is survived by his wife of 45 years, Karen; daughters Elizabeth Smith (Tanner) of Terry, MT; JoAnna Smith of Fort Benton, MT; his mother Juliet of Plentywood, MT; brothers, Gary (Marilyn), Doug, and Rod (Mary) all of Dagmar, MT; grandchildren Abe and Bella Smith of Terry, MT. As well as numerous nieces, nephews, and great-nieces and nephews. He was

preceded in death by his father, 'Big Ed' and a niece Johanna.

Cremation has taken place, private interment at a later date.

A funeral service will be held on Wednesday, April 10th, 2019 at 11:30 am MST at Zion Lutheran Church in Glendive, MT with Pastor Avis Anderson officiating. A reception will follow services at the EPEC in Glendive. Silha Funeral Home of Glendive has been entrusted with the arrangements.

Bruce is a main mentor and influence in my 50 Year career:

Dear Ones, Thank You! Jan 25, 2025

As someone receiving this letter you and/or your family have served as major difference makers in my life! Although born in New York right after the end of WWII and hence a baby-boomer, as it turned out my true life began in Montana and continued to blossom in Idaho! All my "rehab" began with my being hired onto the floors of Lighthouse – a multi-addiction treatment program that included an amazing staff development program.

And also an amazing Christmas caroling staff party with the Deer Lodge Schools staff that introduced me to Corky and then to her special family.

After about three years there at Lighthouse, a visiting training professor recruited me to MSU Bozeman to be her teaching assistant and actually teach psychology intro classes and co-lead practicum for master's students.

From there the Eastern Montana Mental Health Center hired me to be a Montana state psychologist and over the next 12 years sent me to the very best training programs in America & Canada for CEUs and program development. Amazing!

During this time I was invited to join the Montana State Governor's Advisory Council on Children and Youth, which he then turned into Montanans for Children Youth and Families – and later I was elected to be its President.

Getting older and more highly trained, I ended up specializing in treating abuse victims and perpetrators and had to start a private practice for both physical and sexual abuse. Those were tough years but also led me into more marriage and parenting CEUs from the best in the USA and to the point I became a Trainer of Trainers for all of them.

During all this time my Faith in God and turning to Jesus was also growing strong and I began using the teaching skills I was gaining to lead church programs for individuals, couples and families.

This led to my receiving the courses and training to become an Ordained Minister and bi-vocational in both Pastoring and providing a family Counseling service. When that small and elderly congregation could no longer afford to pay my salary I continued to serve them another year or so until a Montana winter road commute accident required a move.

Soon thereafter a family emergency precipitated a further move all the way to Idaho! Now these last 10 years in my 50 year career have also been service: at first commuting 840 miles one way from home to work in Glendive where I still had a contract to lead treatment programs in the eastern regional prison (at first I was home once a month, then twice, and then weekly – which was when I was able to start working as a counselor for our church counseling program and for A New Path

(now Trivium) in their domestic violence offender rehab program – until one annual review when I was in ID fulltime and I asked if they would prefer me as a treatment provider or an Evaluator, and they asked me to do evaluations.

This led to my still leading church programs, such as those mentioned above plus being one of the founders of one of our area's Celebrate Recovery Program, and using all of my court and mental health training to do over 800 four to seven hour full court evaluations. .

Retiring this year has led me to still serve the church and begin the long process of sorting through 50 years of accumulated training materials – someone recently said that may require all of 2025!

As for you, one of my elder prayer leaders once stood up at the end of prayer, took a step forward and pointed directly at me and said, “Jesus love you and so do !!” That is my message to you too! Pete Bruno
